Free School Meals

Families who receive certain benefits may be eligible for free school meals if you are in receipt of one of the following benefits:

- Universal Credit with an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, before benefits are considered.
- Income Support.
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance.
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance.
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit.
- Working Tax Credit run on (paid for the four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit).
- Child Tax Credit (with no Working Tax Credit) with an annual income of no more than £16,190.

Registering for the free meals raises money for school, to fund valuable support like extra tuition, additional teaching staff or school activities. This additional money is available from central government for every child whose parent is receiving one of the benefits listed above.

If your child is in full time education, and you receive one or more of the benefits stated above, please fill in an application form even if your child is in Reception, Year 1 or Year 2. This is because they are also entitled to things like free milk, help towards school trips and other support. Mobile Phones and chewing gum

In the exceptional circumstance that your child needs to bring a mobile phone into school, please could we ask that you contact the school office to let us know that they have it with them. This is so it can be taken and put in the school office to ensure that we are following safeguarding procedures.

Please can we make sure that children do not bring chewing gum into school, unfortunately we have found some again this week.


- Please let the school know if you have recently changed any of your contact details: address, email, phone numbers etc, so we can keep our records up to date.



In reading, Year 6 have learnt about The Underground Railroad which was a route for enslaved African Americans to gain their freedom by escaping to Canada.






BELOW DECK: A TITANIC


